#### **Key Highlights from Last Week....**

The GCSE and A Level exams have now finished, and I have to say it was one of the most positive exam seasons I've ever known. It was great to see many of the students from Year 9 taking part in a trip to Alton Towers last Friday. The trip went well and there was an amazing buzz about the trip throughout the week. A big thank you to all the staff who organised and attended the trip. I know it was a very long day for everyone but worth it for the students.

It was lovely to meet a range of pupils from some of our feeder primary schools last week. This included 3 pupils from Delves Junior School who came to work with Mr Radburn and the DT department for the morning. They had won a competition in their school to design a logo/badge for the Year 6 leavers and were able to come and use our 3D printer to bring their designs to life! Congratulations to the winning pupils – the designs were amazing!

We also hosted a primary netball competition on Wednesday last week with 4 local primary schools taking part (Hilary, Whitehall, Cauldmore and Palfrey). The weather was perfect for the event (thank goodness!) and the teams had a great time. It was good to see them improving as players as the tournament went on, as well as enjoying the spirit of competition. I know that most of the pupils who took part in the tournament will be joining us in September in Year 7 so this was a good introduction to Joseph Leckie. Thank you to the PE department for hosting and running this event.

## **Key Reminders and Academy Expectations...**

This week I have dedicated this section to some important safeguarding information, designed to keep all our young people safe, especially when they are using the internet. The information below has been taken from some recent research undertaken on behalf of the Internet Watch Foundation (IWF).

#### Tips for helping children stay safe online

'Self-generated' child sexual abuse material (CSAM) has been the subject of some recent research on behalf of the Internet Watch Foundation. 'Self-generated' CSAM are images and videos which are taken by children and then shared either:

- willingly, usually with a boyfriend/girlfriend, or
- unwillingly, through coercion, or
- shared by a third party without their consent.

Some of these images end up being distributed, sometimes sold, on the open and dark web by those with a sexual interest in children.

Just over 300 children took part in the IWF research and talked about their experiences of growing up in a digital world, where they talk to their friends, game and do their schoolwork online. Many described receiving unwanted sexual images and some commented that it has become normalised and part of their lives. The Apps they use, such as Snapchat and TikTok are also used by perpetrators to talk to children and groom them into sharing sexual images. This is a serious safeguarding issue, with wide-reaching consequences that we all need to learn more about.

- Learn about the platforms and Apps your child loves. Take an interest in their online life.
- Know how to use tools, apps and settings that can help to keep your child safe online.
